What are they saying/doing regarding vouchers?	Hunter said he believes private school vouchers would negatively impact rural school districts by incentivizing students to leave public schools for private schools, which would take funding away from public schools. Texas schools receive funding from the state based on average daily attendance, about \$6,160 per student, which is especially crucial to rural districts that might not have many students. She then joined voucher supporters in voting to keep the proposal in a bill under consideration during the most recent special session last month, called by Gov. Greg Abbott in an attempt to get vouchers passed. She was one of just four Republicans who switched from voucher opposition in April to support in November, according to The Texas Tribune Orr said last week she changed her stance on the proposal because new guidelines were added that were not included in earlier stages. What are we looking for in a candidate?

What are they saying and doing regarding funding? - Texas is in the bottom 10 states for public school funding. We would have to increase our annual per student funding by \$3,000 just to be average. Teachers and public school employees have been stretching insufficient dollars for years – really decades. Texas has a terrific economy. We could have the best public schools in the country, but we need adequate funding to move forward. Texas had a \$32 billion budget surplus last session and none of it went to fund public schools. So now, instead of moving forward, districts are making cuts to already tight budgets. Let's vote for candidates who will prioritize funding for public schools.

What are they saying and doing regarding vouchers? - School vouchers, also called "school choice" or "educational savings accounts," give tax money to parents to pay to put their kids in private schools. Voucher supporters say vouchers help low-income kids get a chance at a better education, but we know from programs in other states that they are mainly used by people who can already afford to have their kids in private schools. Governor Greg Abbott is determined to pass a voucher plan, but, so far, enough Republican and Democrat legislators have voted against it that he has failed. People from both parties understand that vouchers benefit only a few students at best. We don't need vouchers; we need to fund public schools adequately to provide a great education for all kids. Vouchers are a distraction at best. At worst they drain funds and support from the public schools that serve the vast majority of our kids. Let's vote for candidates who will vote NO on vouchers, at least until we have fully funded public schools.

Do they focus on real concerns or scare tactics? - Think about the educators you know. Chances are, they are working extremely hard to help their students learn the subject matter at hand, to develop critical thinking skills, to find their place in the world, and to grow into good citizens and good people. They are not "indoctrinating children into radical, leftist ideology" or "hyper-sexualizing" them. This kind of talk is a scare tactic and an insult to teachers. In almost every case it is simply not true. Public schools face some serious challenges, no doubt. Finding enough qualified teachers, supporting vulnerable students, managing behavior challenges – these are real concerns. Let's vote for candidates who are talking about real concerns -- not candidates who are using scary words to stir up unfounded controversy and undermine trust in teachers.
